



Summer Headaches...... THE TRIGGERS AND SOLUTIONS

Hot summer weather can be a major catalyst for headaches (especially if you are prone to headaches). But you can take steps to lessen them by knowing the trigger points and learning to control the effects. I've listed the most common below and hope they help to ease any discomfort. Hopefully these kind of headaches can be avoided.

- 1. Trigger skipped meals this habit can cause your blood sugar to plummet and set off a total body chain reaction to sensitive nerves SO don't wait till hunger sets in Eat 6 smaller meals or 3 meals with healthy snacks in between and DRINK OFTEN THROUGH OUT THE DAY TO AVOID DEHYDRATION a major cause of headaches. (Water, water)
- 2. Trigger Perfumes, cleaning products' scent, cigarette, cigar, pipe smoke. Strong odors, even pleasant ones, can kick off misery in many cases of migraines. Certain smells inflame blood vessels in nasal passages in part of brain that processes sensory information. SO, if you are one of these people, try going fragrance free from all fragrances for a week! And avoid places and people where scents are present!!! See if that helps and then you can introduce one fragrance at a time. You may see some are fine and some aromas can not be tolerated. You decide and alter your exposure.
- 3. Trigger Caffeine For some it's the culprit not the fix !!!!!Although a small amount works with pain relieving drugs and can help quell headaches, too much will cause repetitive or rebound headaches. SO, limit your caffeine to 200 mil or 2 cups of coffee a day and factor in the caffeine jolt you get from tea, soda, chocolate and protein bars or drinks.
- 4. Trigger Technology Prolonged staring at a screen of any kind can be bad news for your brains blood vessels and your eyes. Often called "brain pain." SO, take breaks often from your gadgets, be sure you have your eyes checked often with your doctor, and that you wear proper eye glasses. Be sure to install screen protectors which cut glare!
- 5. Trigger Ponytails and tight headbands and tight braids can pull your hair too taut and can strain the tissues in your scalp initiating the kind of muscle and nerve tension that causes headaches. SO, opt for a "chic messy bun" or a less stressful loose ponytail.

GET THE LEAD OUT!!!

As many of you know, for the last month I have been in contact with our local Department of Health office in Monticello regarding testing of our water. I learned this weekend that it is possible that corrosion of lead pipes can result in lead getting into tap water. Lead was used in water pipes in our area until outlawed in 1986.

You can reduce lead in your drinking water by "letting it run." Water that stands idle in pipes for long periods of time, such as overnight or if you are out at work all day, is more likely to absorb materials from the plumbing system. The best way to rid pipes of water that may contain lead, is to let the cold water faucet to run for at least 1-2 minutes.

Other household water uses will also help clear standing water from your home's plumbing. For example, you can establish a routine of flushing the toilet, running the dishwasher or showering first thing in the morning, before using water for drinking or cooking. Keep in mind, you will still need to flush the individual faucets for a short time before using them for drinking.

The water you run from drinking water taps does not have to be wasted. You can use this water for cleaning purposes or for watering plants.

Use only cold water for drinking and cooking. Hot water dissolves lead more quickly than cold water, so don't use hot water from faucet for drinking or cooking. Never use the hot water for baby formula.

FROM THE BOARD

READ THIS CAREFULLY BEFORE YOU HAVE ANY WORK DONE TO THE EXTERIOR OF YOUR UNIT

A reminder to the members that pursuant to the Declaration of Covenants, Restrictions, Easements, Charge and Liens contained on pages 22-39 of the Offering Plan, no work may be performed on the exterior of any unit at Hidden Ridge without first presenting the plans for the proposed work to the Board of Directors and before the Board of Directors approves the nature and scope of the proposed work. A copy of the Declaration can be found on-line under the documents section at the Hidden Ridge web site, www.hiddenridgehoa.org.

Additional rules relating to the construction of decks and patios can be found in the Hidden Ridge A to Z booklet. Each member has been provided with a copy of this booklet. This booklet is also available under the documents tab of the Hidden Ridge web site.

Examples of work that requires prior Board approval includes but is not limited to the construction of a deck or patio, replacements of windows, replacement of storm or unit doors, replacement of basement doors, repairs or replacement of vinyl siding.

The Board has learned that certain contractors have recently constructed a deck at one of the units using materials that were not approved by the Board and replaced a basement door at a unit without first obtaining the approval of the Board for this work. The work done to replace the basement door caused damage to the retaining wall appurtenant to the unit that will have to be repaired.

While any owner may hire any contractor to perform work in or on a unit, work done in violation of HOA rules will have to be repaired or replaced at the homeowners' expense. Please make certain that before you perform any work outside of your unit, you present the proposal to the Board and obtain Board approval for the work. Please make certain that your contractor only performs the work approved by the Board, only uses materials for this work that have been approved by the Board and repairs or restores any HOA property such as retaining walls, sidewalks, roofs, siding involved in the work to the condition it was in prior to the commencement of the work.

If you have any questions regarding whether the work you want to do requires prior Board approval, speak with any member of the Board before starting the work. The names of the Board members are listed in the *GEM*.

can help me make productive contributions toward the operation of the HOA.







Reminders from the Board of Directors

You get your card and stare at the numbers as they are called. You need one or two numbers to win, when the people at the next table (whom you do not like), yell "BINGO!"


Then the people, whom you thought you liked, yelled "BINGO!" The people at the next table, who say that their grand-children bring them luck, yelled "BINGO!"

The following is a description of a Chinese Auction:

A Chinese auction is a combination of a raffle and an auction. The difference between a raffle and a Chinese auction is that in a raffle with multiple prizes, there is one "hat" from which names are drawn, but in a Chinese auction each prize has its own "hat."

In a Chinese auction, people buy tickets, which are chances to win items. 




