The President's Message



Dear Hidden Ridgers,

There are several items I would like to bring to your attention this month:

- Annual Meeting and Elections: On August 8, 2021, we had our Annual Meeting and Elections. For those of you who were there or who sent in absentee ballots or proxy designation, thank you for doing your civic duty. We had representation of about 90 people. I want to thank those who attended in person for your cooperation by wearing masks, sitting in the socially distanced chairs, and listening attentively to what was being said by the Board and your neighbors. It remains a mystery where the other 60 homeowners were? The election results are on page 8.
- Homeowners in Arrears: The Board has voted that effective September 1, 2021, any homeowner who is delinquent 90 or more days will have their names published on the bulletin boards and in the GEM so that the rest of the community can see which of their neighbors are presenting a financial burden on the community.
- Change in Sales Rules: The Board has voted that effective September 1, 2021, any new homeowner will be required to pay three months of maintenance charges along with the transfer fee. We have noticed that it takes approximately 2+ months for the new homeowner's accounts to be set up with Associa.
- Orientation of new homeowners: We held another group session for new homeowners on August 14, 2021. There are still approximately 10 new homeowners who have not attended a session. It is very important that each new homeowner attend a session as there is information that is explained that will eliminate any misunderstanding of our rules and policies. Some homeowners who have been here for some years who attended found the session to be a good refresher.
- Maintenance Projects:

Here is the status of some of the maintenance projects going on this summer:

Gutters: The gutters over the bay windows of the B units is almost complete.

Staining of Retaining Walls: this project is almost complete

 We are currently investigating and accepting proposals for consideration on the following maintenance issues:
 Flooding issues that we have seen at some units when there

Flooding issues that we have seen at some units when there are torrential rains

Rebuilding and repair of storm drains that have aged and are in disrepair

Addressing the gutters on the valleys of the A units Addressing our electrical needs – current and additional lighting

• Getting Ready for the Winter:

Insulation: We have previously advised our members to investigate the free Energy Audit provided by NYS. Information regarding this is on page 8. It is the individual homeowner's responsibility to make sure that their unit is properly insulated for the winter to prevent ice damming.

Heat tapes: We have been in contact with an electrician who is in the process of putting together a proposal for a bulk rate for heat tapes (and their installation) that individual homeowners will be able to purchase and have installed prior to the winter of 2021-22. We will be sending you more information as it becomes available.

We are a community: Please remember that the individuals on the Board of Directors are elected by their peers and are volunteering their time. We need your help – we do not have all the answers! At times we are forced to make some difficult decisions that in the long run we feel are the best for all of us. Every member of our community has something to contribute to the betterment of Hidden Ridge. We need to share these talents, skills, and life experiences to make our community a more vibrant place to live. I become frustrated when I hear that some residents, who have concerns do not address them to us directly. If you have a question, concern, or suggestion, please send a letter or email to the Board Secretary Karen Crumley (KCrumley@hvc.rr.com) so that we can collaboratively resolve the issues. As has been previously said. **Do** not be part of the problem, become part of the solution. No one can do everything, but everyone can do something! Come work with the Board and the community-volunteer!





FROM THE PEN OF.... Peter Morello

t was during the summer of 1974 when I was still sixteen, that good fortune came my way and I was lucky enough to get my first job. I was hired as a cashier by D'Agostino Supermarkets at a newly opened store near where I lived. Up until that time, there were two other D'Agostino Supermarkets in the Bronx - one was located in



the Parkchester section and the other in Riverdale for an otherwise Manhattan-based company.

I went for training at NCR headquarters in Manhattan in order to learn how to use their new registers. Although they had bar code reading capabilities, that option was not purchased by D'Agostino and every price of every item had to be manually entered. Management insisted we use "touch typing" to make entries in order to maintain speed by not taking our eyes off the merchandise which was nearly impossible. Not only did we have to enter the correct prices, but we had to enter the right department as well such as "Deli," "Grocery," "Dairy," etc. As if that weren't enough, we had to know what items were "food stampable" in order to obtain two totals if necessary for the customer – to wit, the food stamp bill and the out-of-pocket items that food stamps wouldn't cover. Fortunately, with the advancement of computers and scanning equipment, that is all a nightmare from the past.

I was so proud to not only have this job, but to be able to receive a paycheck with my name on it every week. It didn't matter to me that I was paid the minimum wage of \$2.00 per hour, rather it was the pleasure of knowing that I was independent and could buy my own clothes and whatever else I needed without relying on my parents. Now I could take the number twelve bus up Fordham Road and visit my favorite clothing store, Bobkoff's, and purchase whatever I wanted. I could go to Cousins on the opposite side of the street and buy the latest record not to mention a switchblade on the upper floor – this was the Bronx, you know. They even sold machetes for the not so faint of heart.

After a few months of dealing with the drudgery of entering endless prices, I was asked by the store manager if I wanted to work in the deli. I eagerly accepted the offer especially since I didn't have to take money but I also realized that it would be easy to make myself a sandwich anytime I wanted even though I wasn't supposed to. In fact, guys from the grocery department would ask me to make them sandwiches in exchange for anything I wanted in the grocery or dairy departments to eat or drink. We had a fair, if not dishonest, reciprocal relationship that benefited both sides and no one in management was the wiser - you should have seen what they did in the era before cameras were spread. Inspectors would come around from the city and rather than cite the store and issue expensive fines, the manager would allow the inspector to fill up a grocery cart with a week's worth of groceries and bid him a fond farewell as he left the store while collecting a taxpayer provided paycheck.

When I returned to my senior year in September of `74,

what direction my life would turn as I approached the last year of high school. Many thoughts were swirling in my head and some would say delusions of grandeur. I didn't know exactly what I wanted to study, having so many interests; but I envisioned myself going to Cornell or at the very least Fordham University, which at the time was considered a rather safe bet. There was so much talk among my peers as to where they would be attending college and this seemed to reflect more their socioeconomic status more than their grades. Nonetheless, such talk was intimidating to a sixteen-year-old and things didn't get any better when I turned seventeen in January, 1975.

October marked the month that we all had to sit for our class photos. Back then, we all thought everyone's hair length was fine, but as I look back at my yearbook now, it's amazing how

many of the guys I would label "slobs" by today's standards. I'm sure they too must cringe when they go to a reunion and they get stuck wearing their high school photo on their chest. Few of the guys bothered to put on a dress shirt and tie but I must admit, most of the ladies looked good to me—at least they combed their hair, especially Debbie Grossman—a class act.



When I saw Debbie's photo it stood out above all the others and I realized I never had a crush on her until she asked me out and revealed

that her parents wouldn't be happy with such an arrangement. It was only then that I longed for something that today we would call "a near miss." None of these feelings would have come to the surface had she not said anything to me – but I'm sure glad she did.

As 1975 rolled around I began to learn that many otherwise very smart and well-prepared students were perfectly satisfied to attend one of the various City of New York colleges. This was surprising to me considering that "open enrollment" had started a few years earlier and by all accounts, eventually became an abject failure. Students were admitted who couldn't read at even the high school level and instead of improving the lower grades, our wonderful "leaders decided to cave to protestors who believed that a college education was "a right." It's not surprising that in many ways we're in the same predicament today. Nonetheless, I knew many students who were interested in studying various scientific disciplines that seemed to be unaffected by open enrollment and went on to careers in science and medicine.

I knew my mother didn't want me to go away to college and she never understood why there would be such a need given the many fine universities that were in New York City. My feeling was that it would be an adventure and maybe even good for me even though it may not have been realistic financially. My brother had gone to Lehman and earned a degree in accounting and did very well for himself and this seemed to be uppermost in my mother's mind. My best friend Steve, decided to go to Hunter College and several friends either went to Queens College, Baruch or Lehman which was only about two long blocks away. When I found out that one of the best students in the school and a good friend of mine, Robert Vosatka, wanted to go to Lehman and double major in biochemistry and physics, I came to the conclusion that that would be good enough for me. So I joined him and many others of my graduating class at Lehman.

Of course, there were those who did go to Ivy League schools and there was no shortage of them. I heard plenty of excitement

when classmates were accepted to Harvard, Yale, Princeton and Cornell, among others. Somehow, I couldn't wrap my head around the idea that someone from the projects could go to such special schools but now we see that all the time with immigrants and it's become expected in some circles. Coming from a conservative

Italian

family, dreams were modest if they existed at all and one was lucky to be able to have a decent place to live and food on the table. If you were really fortunate, you could even own an automobile

Although it may seem almost impossible to believe, there was a very tiny minority of students who didn't go to college for one reason or another or who started and didn't finish. I don't know if any statistics are kept on this but I'm sure the number must be very small and the regrets many.

The idea of leaving the academic cocoon of Bronx Science saddened me greatly. I have to admit I never met a finer group of young people who were unassuming and came from rather humble backgrounds. There was a smattering of students who came from more moneyed backgrounds in Riverdale, Queens and Manhattan and whose parents were professionals but their achievements were no greater than those who came from more financially challenging situations. It all boiled down to effort and the underestimated affects of two-parent households. No matter in what neighborhood a student lived or how inadequate the housing may have been, having two parents who were involved in their children's' education and guided them when necessary, outweighed anything else. I've seen many young people who were otherwise very intelligent become derailed in life because they came from a fatherless home even though we can point to many success stories where strong-willed mothers ruled the roost. The lure of the streets and a fast buck can be intoxicating to a young person who is impatient and sees a lifestyle glorified on the silver screen. This factor has been overlooked in the debate over who succeeds in gaining admission to the specialized high schools and it's become anathema to even broach the topic.

As graduation neared, I became increasingly uneasy realizing that I would never be able to replicate the past three years. I felt jealous that my teachers got to remain behind and actually got paid for doing so but I was supposedly going on to something better. I thought if it was so much better then why do I feel so lousy and down.

What eventually buoyed my spirits was listening to the ambition and eagerness of my classmates to delve into the future and the confidence to do so. Not being one of abundant confidence, I found it more difficult to do so but I slowly began to think more like them as their thoughts rubbed off on me and my ambition began to swell.

However, no matter how ambitious my thoughts were I couldn't prevent the negative side of me from creeping into my mind and reminding me of something John Lennon once said. "Life is what happens when you're busy making other plans."

This is the final episode of Peter's memoir about his high school career. It was fun going back with Peter to high school and reminisce about our teenage years....



Reminders from the Board of Directors

Barbeques: Barbeques may not be used on any front lawn and emptying coal on any common area is prohibited. (A fire extinguisher is recommended nearby.) You may use the barbeque away from your unit in the rear of your house. Never leave a barbeque unattended.



Outdoor Furniture: May be left on the grass areas. However, please move it to allow for lawn care from our landscapers. Please do not leave outdoor furniture outside during the winter months.



Wood: Stacking of wood for your fireplace is permitted. Do not stack the wood against your house or vinyl siding. A distance of 3 feet is recommended. A wood holder is recommended.



Dogs: All residents (homeowners and renters) are to register their dogs (including service dogs) with the homeowners association and provide proof of current rabies vaccination. Please send this information to Bonnie Siegel.

All dogs residing in Hidden Ridge for a period of 30 consecutive days must also be registered and licensed in the Town of Thompson. Proof of this license must be presented to the homeowners



association. All homeowners shall provide proof the dog is licensed in the jurisdiction in which the dog's primary residence is maintained, if the dog does not reside for a period of 30 consecutive days in Hidden Ridge.

Dog owners are responsible for abiding by the regulations set forth by the Town of Thompson which includes picking up after their dog, dogs on leashes, no dogs at the pool, avoiding excessive barking, etc.

Landscaping: Each homeowner is responsible for the landscaping within the 3 ½ feet of their unit in the front, back and sides (if an end unit). The common grounds of our community will be maintained by the landscaping company. If a homeowner wants to exceed the 3 ½ feet, they need approval from the Board.



Flushing: Do not flush anything but toilet paper down your toilets. Cottenelle or other freshening wipes will clog the sewer system and will disrupt the flow of sewerage from the community. We have had problems where wipes, sanitary napkins and paper towels have caused problems for homeowners.



Bulk Garbage: Please do not put furniture, old appliances or large items in or next to the dumpsters. The dumpsters are for household garbage. If you need a bulk pick up, please arrange to have them carted away by the delivery people or by call Thompson Sanitation at 845 796 1032.



Guests and the Gates

All guests and other visitors (deliveries, etc.) must enter through the Old Liberty Road entrance

- Your guest will scroll to your name on the telephone access pad.
- There are instructions on the screen for the telephone access pad. Your guest will scroll the A-Z listing to your last name. Your guest can "Push Call." The dialer (gate) will dial the phone number that is associated with you
- Upon answering your phone (and speaking to your guest) you will press 9 on that phone and the gate will open.
- FYI The phone number of the gate is (845) 794-0681.

Please be aware that the several of our regular vendors (US Post Office, UPS, FedEx, Time Warner Cable, etc.) will receive either a four digit access code or a remote. Emergency personnel will have a siren sensor for access.
